“N. O. Nelson Beyond Leclaire”

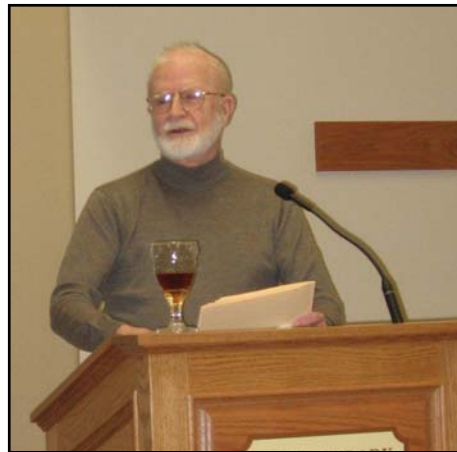

FOL APPROVES MATCHING FUNDS FOR GARDENS

Help Us Beautify Leclaire

At our February meeting, Friends of Leclaire approved matching funds up to \$500 for donations dedicated to the new Leclaire Garden Court. The Court at the N. O. Nelson Campus is part of the Gardens of Lewis and Clark Community College. It is a Signature Garden of the

Missouri Botanical Garden. The gardens will be built and maintained with grants and donations from the community. They are all-organic gardens using no chemicals.

One of the features of the garden in Leclaire will be a commissioned sculpture by John Medwedeff funded by a state grant and matching in-kind gifts of the Olin Corporation. The sculpture will incorporate items manufactured by the N. O. Nelson Mfg Company. Other significant donations have been made by Hortica and by the Win-Nelson Company, the Ohio company that purchased what remained of the N. O. Nelson Company.

The Nelson Campus has been an incredible gift to our neighborhood, preserving our history, and increasing the aesthetic appeal as well as property values in the neighborhood. Please consider a contribution in any amount towards this matching grant appeal. To qualify for a recognition plaque in the garden with the Friends of Leclaire name, FOL would need to collect \$2500. The board has agreed to match the first \$500. We hope individuals and businesses will join us to reach that goal, but any donation for the garden will be appreciated.

The line of osage orange trees (hedge apples) planted by the Nelson Manufacturing Company to separate the factory grounds from the residential area of Leclaire over 100 years ago were recently trimmed by horticulturalists from the Missouri Botanical Garden. Some residents expressed concern that they might be removed, but these historic plantings are a part of the master plan for the Leclaire gardens. The gardeners were merely giving the trees a much needed trim to extend their lives.

ROUTE 66 FESTIVAL

Friends of Leclaire, along with other historic groups in Edwardsville, host an information table at the “History Tent” for the Route 66 Festival. Two people are needed to man the tables, usually in 2-3 hour “shifts”.

GOSHEN MARKET

Friends of Leclaire has a table at the Goshen Market once a month where we provide information about Leclaire and sell our Leclaire merchandise. Two people are needed to host the booth. If you are new to the organization, we can pair you with an experienced volunteer. Volunteers need to show up before the opening bell to help set up the booth and stay until the booth is down. Leclaire to Have City Water

The Edwardsville Water Company started yesterday on a piece of work which involves more interests than any that has so far been evolved. The suburb, Leclaire, is to be connected with the water system of Edwardsville, and the change will be effected within a week. Workmen have started at the corner of Fillmore and Wolf streets digging the ditch in which will be laid the six-inch connecting pipe. Leclaire has at the present a system of waterworks supplied from a well and pond. Each house has water from it and there are a goodly number of street hydrants. The factories draw their supply from the same source. Pressure is maintained by several tanks elevated upon a tower. The change will be easily made. The system will be tapped by another supply pipe and pure filtered river water will flow through the pipes instead of pond water as heretofore. The present water tower at Leclaire will be allowed to stand, as a reserve in case anything should happen to the other supply.

Nelson Company Announce Change Leclaire Kindergarten Will Operate Next Season on Nominal Fee Basis.

An announcement has been made by Nelson Lawnin of the N. O. Nelson Mfg. Company, that on account of eliminating all non-essential activities, the Leclaire Kindergarten will be

operated this coming season in a limited way on a nominal fee basis. Miss Mildred Shaw, who has been an instructor in the kindergarten for a number of years, has been placed in charge. She will ask a reasonable tuition from all, except children of the N. O. Nelson Mfg. Company.

The Leclaire Kindergarten was established about 35 years ago by N. O. Nelson, founder of the Nelson Mfg. Company, a philanthropist of international fame and a great lover of children. The kindergarten is being kept up as a memorial to him.

Under the old plan Leclaire residents and employees of the Nelson

Company have received free tuition and a very small charge was made to non-residents. This season, according to the announcement, only employees' children will be admitted free.

The kindergarten is ideally located in a residential district with a well kept playground. The building is large, admitting fresh air and sunshine, so essential to a child's health. It has been accommodating on an average of 55 children a year.

The kindergarten has always had the recommendation and co-operation of the public school authorities and primary teachers and also the services of a community nurse.

Kindergarten diplomas are given and any child who has been working for one will have an opportunity to finish the work and receive a diploma, while others may start.

Miss Shaw has been a teacher in the school for 12 years and for the past three years has been in charge. She is the daughter of William Shaw, one of the directors in the Nelson Company and a resident of Leclaire for many years.

Kindergarten will open September 1 at 9 A. M. Children four years of age by November 1 are eligible to enter.
