LECLAIRE PARK SURVEYED

After Leclaire Parkfest, Friends of Leclaire spoke to local surveyor Jeffrey Pauk of Madison County Surveyors about the possibility of obtaining a new survey of Leclaire Park. As it happened, he was teaching CNST 482 Advanced Surveying Systems at SIUE this fall and they needed a project. On Sunday, November 12, Jeff and eight students spent four hours measuring every stationary object in the park to include it on the survey, even barbeque grills. There will be additional work to convert all of the measurements into a map, but Parkfest vendor coordinator Theresa Morrison will be delighted with a new and improved map for next year's festival. Leclaire Parkfest vendor Taqueria Z donated a portion of their profits to Friends of Leclaire in memory of Mimi Zanger, a former resident of Leclaire, whose son, Mike Zanger, is one of the owners of the restaurant. 905 HALE AVENUE - THE REVELLE HOME

The home at 905 Hale Avenue has one of the best locations in Leclaire, across from the lake. The house was completed before Nov 5, 1912, in time for newlyweds James Elijah Revelle, Jr. and his bride, Hermenia "Minnie" Sehnert Revelle, to move in following their wedding at St. Mary's Catholic

Church in Edwardsville.

Both were well-established in Leclaire before moving into the house on Hale Avenue. Minnie was the youngest daughter of Louis and Frances Sehnert who owned and operated the Sehnert Hotel on Wolf Street. A great nephew, Lee Sandlin, wrote about the Sehnert family in a bestselling book, Distancers: An American Memoir, in 2004. Many in the Sehnert family built homes in Leclaire.

James grew up in Stallings, a farming area southwest of Edwardsville in Nameoki Township. In fact, his mother's maiden name was Stallings so they were well-rooted in that community. In 1892, James's father was hit by a train. He eventually recovered only to be struck by lightning and killed in 1897. His widow and children stayed on the farm for a time, but in 1899 Sarah Stallings Revelle and her four youngest children, including James, Jr., moved to Edwardsville to a home at 143 North Kansas Street.

James was a tall, athletic young man who captained the Edwardsville bowling team and was a pitcher for the Leclaire Blues baseball team. In 1906, after clerking at other stores in town, he found a job as assistant man-

ager at the Leclaire Cooperative Store. Two years later he took over as manager. The Leclaire store was located near the Leclaire factory buildings on Wolf Street near the Sehnert Hotel.

In 1915, James left the Leclaire Cooperative Store to start his own business, Revelle's Grocery at 144 N. Main Street in the

Tunnell Building. Four years later, James and Minnie sold the house on Hale Avenue to Charles Edwards and moved to 147 N. Kansas where the Edwards family had previously been living. The Kansas Street location put the Revelles next door to James' mother and just a block from Revelle's Grocery.

The Revelles remained in Edwardsville until the death of James' mother, Sarah in 1921. That year he sold his grocery business and began a career that took the family all over the country. For many years he was a salesman for Quaker Oats before retiring to Florida.

The second family to purchase the house, Charles and Emma Edwards, were on Hale Avenue for only a short time before following their daughter to California. In Edwardsville, Charles and his brother William ran the Edwards Brothers Ice House

at 333 S. Kansas Street. Alverita's School of Cosmetology occupies that building today.

In 1922 the house was purchased by Fred and Anna Feldmeier Kuethe who moved in with their three children, Elsie, Raymond and


Helen. The Kuethe children were teenagers and thoroughly enjoyed Leclaire Lake as evident in many photographs of them passed down through the family and shared by Roger Buchta of Glen Carbon.

The Coroniotis family purchased the house in 1938. Costa Coroniotis, a Greek immigrant, was a wholesale meat dealer and the buildings across the back of the lot are a reminder of that legacy. Part of them contained refrigeration units for his business. Costa and his wife Magdelena also left a wonderful photographic record of the house which was shared by their daughter, Helen Coroniotis Wiemers..

There was a short-term owner in the late 1950s that did not occupy the house. He rented the house to Julius Elwood Barth and his family who moved into the house about 1961, and purchased the home in 1969. Elwood had been a business partner of Costa Coroniotis, so the refrigeration unit included with the property made it an ideal home for the Barth family. The current owners purchased the property from the Barth family, but the refrigeration facility was gone when they purchased the home.

Unlike many Leclaire homes, this house occupies all of its originally platted lot. Even though most Leclaire lots on the east side of Troy Road were plat-

ted with 100 foot street frontage the majority of these lots were split into two building lots. James Revelle originally purchased the south half of Lot Ten and another party purchased the north half. In 1939 the Coroniotis family purchased the vacant north side of Lot Ten, and it has been sold as one lot ever since.

MANY HANDS MAKE LIGHT WORK - FOL PROVERB


