LECLAIRE PARK IMPROVEMENTS

The Edwardsville Parks and Recreation Department has made many improvements at LeClaire Park this fall. The water level of the Lake was lowered in late summer so a stone wall could be installed along the Madison Avenue bank of the lake. There have been issues with the bank (and sidewalk) collapsing for many years, and this offers a permanent solution. While water levels were low, Friends of LeClaire volunteers were able to get out into the lake to recover 12 blocks from the wall surrounding the "beach" and 175 landscaping bricks. Most will be reinstalled before LeClaire Parkfest.

The long-planned for sidewalk, winding its way along the western bank near the playground, was installed this September and is as beautiful as anticipated. (See photo above.)

And finally, the old sycamore tree that gracefully bowed over the south end of the lake was removed last month. The old tree had died, but as one local resident observed, it probably had a tackle box full of fishing gear in its branches. It was a favorite fishing spot, where many fishermen cast too high and lost their lines in the tree.

MEMORIAL BRICKS AVAILABLE

Friends of LeClaire is again selling Memorial Bricks to be installed around the bandstand at LeClaire Park. Previously, bricks were sold about 15 years ago to help pay for sidewalks in the park. If you would like to honor a child, grandchild, friend or parents with an engraved brick at LeClaire Park, there is an application on our website and copies will be available at the Friends of LeClaire booth at LeClaire Parkfest. Founding member of Friends of Leclaire, Mary Blain, 66, passed away on Wednesday, Aug 30 in Creve Coeur, Missouri. She served as treasurer of the organization for many years and also volunteered her artistic talents. Many of the photographs people enjoy at the annual Leclaire Parkfest were put together by Mary for the Leclaire Centennial celebration in 1990. Every year she decorated the Leclaire bandstand to give Parkfest a festive atmosphere even before people arrived. Then she set up her photo booth, "Memories by Mary" and provided hundreds with souvenir pictures of Leclaire Parkfest.

But what will be remembered most about Mary Blain is her heart. She was full of kindness, compassion and joy, qualities that became evident to anyone who had the opportunity to know her. She will be sorely missed. Friends of Leclaire extend deepest sympathy to her husband Bob, daughter Kelly, grandson Daniel, and all of what Mary called her extended "phamily."

NO MEETING IN JANUARY

516 EAST AVENUE - SWEDISH IMMIGRANT HOME

In early Leclaire photographs, a large house stands alone at the southeast corner of Leclaire Lake. The home at 516 East Avenue remains a standout in Leclaire today, although that was not the address for the house until 1927.

It was built by the N. O. Nelson Manufacturing Company in 1914 and sold to the Hallquist family. Anders "Gustaf" Hallquist and his wife, Axelina Petersson Hallquist were Swedish immigrants who came to America in 1892 with five

Einar Hallquist married Alma Ammann, daughter of J. F. Ammann, the nationally known florist who brought Florist Mutual (now Hortica) to Edwardsville.

Ralph married Hilda Tuxhorn, the daughter of Albert and Edith Metcalf Tuxhorn. She grew up in the Metcalf House at 7 Logan Place behind the Leclaire factories. Part of Leclaire sits on land purchased from her grandfather, Andrew W. Metcalf.

young children, John, Margaret, Einar, Swen and Ralph. The oldest was 11 and the youngest an infant when they made the voyage. The family of seven made their way to St. Louis where they settled for a few years, before moving to Leclaire in 1897. Gustaf had been trained as a woodworker in Sweden, and he found work in the Cabinet Mill of the N. O. Nelson Manufacturing Company.

The Hallquist family rented a house on Holyoake Road when they arrived, then purchased 827 Holyoake in 1902 where they lived until moving to the beautiful four-square house on the corner near Leclaire Lake. By the time they moved into their new home in 1915, there were two more children, Karene and Dora, but their older children were, by then, starting to move out to start families of their own.

Anders Gustaf Hallquist died of pneumonia in 1921. He was 62 years old. In his obituary it said, "Mr. Hallquist was of a rather quiet and unassuming disposition. He desired to take care of his business affairs and when not engaged at the bench gave attention to his house."

Mrs. Hallquist remained in the home until 1925 when she moved to St. Louis to live with her son Ralph. Most of the Hallquist children moved away after they married, but three retained close ties to Edwardsville.

Because of their marriages, both of the above families visited Edwardsville often even after moving away. Swen Hallquist married Margaret Whitford who was a descendant of the notable Leverett and Chapman families of Edwardsville. Margaret died in 1940, and Swen moved to north-western Illinois in the late 1940s after he remarried.

Alexina Hallquist sold the house on East Avenue to Louis and Elvina Abenbrink a week after their Sep 4, 1925 wedding. The house at that time had an address of 1000 Madison Avenue, but soon was changed to 516 East Avenue.

Louis Abenbrink, a WW I veteran, was born in Hamel Township to Frederick and Johanna Abenbrink. His parents had both been married before and widowed when they found each other. Unfortunately Frederick died just before Louis was born in 1887. From this humble beginning, Louis worked his way up through the business world to the position of partner and president of the A & B Feed and Seed on St. Louis Street. The feed store was located where the Bank of Edwardsville's main offices are located today.

Elvina Weidner Abenbrink grew up on a farm in Pin Oak Township.

In 1922 her father retired from farming, and the family moved to 407 Franklin Avenue. Her father accepted a position with the N. O. Nelson Manufacturing Company, and the family settled into their new home just two blocks from Elvina's brother Leo and his family at 211 Franklin Avenue. After moving to town Elvina found employment as an operator for Illinois Bell Telephone. As was the custom, she became a homemaker after her marriage.

After the death of Elvina's father in 1940, her mother, Elizabeth Weidner, moved in with Louis and Elvina. In 1950, they sold the house at 516 East Avenue, and the three of them moved to a house at 507 Franklin Avenue which became their retirement home. Elizabeth Weidner died in 1957 and Louis Abenbrink in 1968. Elvina stayed in the Franklin Avenue house until her death in 1987.

One of the current occupants of 516 East Avenue has lived there since 1967, so she knew Mrs. Abenbrink as a neighbor (just across the alley). Mrs. Abenbrink told her they

moved from the house after they gave up on having children, but given the fact that they were in their 60s when they moved, that may not be the case. It's more likely that they moved because there were no bedrooms on the first floor of the house at 516 East Avenue. By 1950, Elvina's mother was in her 80s. A few years after the Abenbrinks moved to 507 Franklin, Mary Weidner, widow of Elvina's brother Leo, moved into a new house at 511 Franklin Avenue in 1956. Members of the Weidner family certainly left their mark on the 500 block of Franklin and East Avenues

There were three short-term residents of the East Avenue house between 1950 and 1967, but the house has been lovingly maintained for 50 years by two generations of the family occupying the house today.
