## **NICKEL PLATE STATION DEDICATED**

After a wait of nearly 30 years, restoration of the Nickel Plate Station in Leclaire has finally been completed due to the efforts of the City of Edwardsville and a long list of donors and volunteers who made it possible. On April 30, 2021, the historic Nickel Plate Station was dedicated.

The station is now part of the Edwardsville Children's Museum and will be used for expanded programming beginning

July 1. It will eventually serve a dual purpose as a children's museum and visitor information center after exhibits are completed.

## FOL NEWSLETTER RECOGNIZED

The Friends of Leclaire Newsletter was awarded a Certificate of Merit by the Illinois State Historical Society at their Best of Illinois History celebration held via Zoom on April 23. A quarterly publication, it has been published by the Friends of Leclaire (FOL) since 1990.

The newsletter was founded by Bob Blain 31 years ago to build awareness of organization activities and to inform residents of the history of the Leclaire National Historic District. In the early years it was one sheet of paper with content on both sides, but soon grew to be a fourpage newsletter with additional stories of Leclaire. In the late 1990s, Cindy Reinhardt began writing articles for the newsletter and in 2012, when a new layout made it easier to write and edit at the same time, Reinhardt became editor. The newsletters are hand-delivered by volunteers to every home in Leclaire and mailed to members living outside the historic district.

Normally, in this report, I thank our Parkfest volunteers and those that helped with other activities throughout the year. However, after some preliminary planning, Parkfest was cancelled due to the pandemic. We always thought that FOL might need to cancel Leclaire Parkfest because of weather some day, but no one would have forecast that a pandemic would sideline the festival.

Despite the pandemic, we did have some events and activities. On March 8, the Sunday before the shutdown, Cindy gave a presentation on N. O. Nelson and Leclaire to the Norwegian Society of St. Louis. They loved hearing the story of a fellow Norwegian.

As usual, we published four issues of our now "awardwinning" newsletter (see story). Our newsletters are read and shared by people throughout Edwardsville and beyond.

FOL gardening volunteers worked on flower beds in Leclaire Park and at the Children's Museum. A tree was donated to the Children's Museum. Following a tradition of making improvements to Leclaire Park, a new turtle spring rider was purchased for the park's playground.

FOL also donated \$1,500 toward restoration of the Nickel Plate Station. Thanks to a generous donation from Will and Liz Krause, a "Welcome to Historic Leclaire" sign was placed at the corner of South Plum and Franklin. FOL paid for the installation. 24 memorial bricks were sold and installed at Leclaire Park.

FOL members were very good at sending in renewals, and despite the pandemic, we have seven new members. Thank you for your trust in FOL and our future.

After 12 years as president and 20 on the Friends of Leclaire board, I have decided to retire. Now, to paraphrase Candide, "I must tend to my garden," though I plan to still help with the gardens at the park.
